“Who is my neighbor?”

During my priestly formation at the North American College in Rome, I was fortunate to have a classmate somewhat close to my age who is now a priest for the Diocese of Orange in California. He too had a prior career in insurance. He had been an agent for State Farm. We used to love to kid him about how he made his fortune bilking little old ladies out of their money. But then he would always retort that he did nothing of the sort. In fact, he would say that he was like the Good Samaritan, because like a good neighbor, State Farm is there.

That slogan, “Like a good neighbor State Farm is there,” comes from a jingle written by Brooklyn’s own Barry Manilow. The lyrics, rarely heard anymore, are beautiful: “Whenever you’re driving and wherever you’re bound, on freeways and byways the whole country round. You’ll feel better knowing anytime, anywhere, that like a good neighbor, State Farm is there. Your home’s where your heart is; it’s a feeling that grows. The house that you live in, the love that it shows. We hope the good times never leave us behind. We face our tomorrows with some peace of mind. No man has a promise of life without care, and like a good neighbor, State Farm is there.”

This weekend’s Gospel contains the familiar parable known as *The Good Samaritan*. It is about a man robbed, beaten, and left half-dead on the road. A priest and a Levite pass him by while, in what must have been a shocking plot twist for the people of Jesus’ day, a Samaritan, someone who would have been looked down upon and despised for being an unclean heretic by the Jews, went out of his way to show the victim mercy and compassion by caring for his needs. This parable was Jesus’ response to a scholar of the law who was testing him by asking what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus first showed that the scholar already knew the answer that the Jewish Scriptures provided to that question: “You shall love the Lord your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself.” But, St. Luke says, the scholar wished to justify himself and so he further asked Jesus the question, “And who is my neighbor?”

Now it was common at that time for Jewish scholars of the law to nuance the law and to try to find the minimum that could be done to satisfy the law. The scholar wanted to know: Is neighbor defined by proximity? Is neighbor defined by ethnicity, race or religion? Are all Jews my neighbor, or only Jews from my town, or perhaps only Jews from my extended family? But what Jesus is really saying in the parable of the Good Samaritan is, “You are asking the wrong question. Don’t ask, ‘who is my neighbor,’” as if being a neighbor is something static and passive according to a checklist of characteristics. Rather, the better question to ask is, “What must I do to be a good neighbor? Who needs my assistance that I can help?” Jesus turns the word ‘neighbor’, a noun, into a verb, and an action verb at that.

Despite what popular opinion might have you believe, being a Christian is not about a lot of thou shalt nots. Like being a good neighbor, it is something positive, it is something active. It is all about love. The Second Vatican Council teaches that by virtue of our baptism, all Christians are called to holiness. And holiness is the perfection of love. Holiness does not just consist in not sinning, but in actively loving. This parable leaves no doubt that our neighbor is anyone in need, and that we, as neighbor, have a duty and responsibility to help that person. Our help must be as wide as the love of God. And that help must be practical. It is not just a matter of having the right disposition, of feeling sorry for someone in need. No doubt the priest and the Levite felt pity for the wounded man, but they did nothing to help him. As followers of Jesus, we must share his love and compassion. Like a good neighbor, Christ calls us, his disciples, to be there. And he urges us, like he urged that scholar of the law, “Go, and do likewise.” – Fr. Bob

NEXT YEARS RELIGION CLASSES WILL BEGIN SUNDAY-SEPTEMBER 18,2022.

REGISTRATION IS ON GOING UNTIL THE END OF AUGUST. As of August 1st there is an additional fee of \$25.00. Take advantage and register early.

**Two years of religion is needed when preparing for a sacrament. When your child is in first grade, register them to start their preparation for First Holy Communion.*

REGISTRATION: The continuation of your child's faith formation is very important and on going toward the preparation of the Sacrament of Confirmation, which they receive in the 8th grade. When registering, a \$20.00 deposit is sufficient. Full payment can be made at a later date. If paying by check, make the check out to **St. Mark Religious Education Program**. Please print neatly. Forms are available in the rectory or online.

NEW REGISTRATION: A copy of the child's birth, baptismal certificates, and Transfer papers if coming from another parish, are required at the time of registration. Registration forms are available at the rectory, which can be filled out and deposit paid or forms can be completed on line and payment made at the rectory.

RCIA- Rite of Christian Initiation & Adult Confirmation This is a process through which non-baptized adults prepare to receive the Sacraments of Initiation-Baptism, Confirmation & Eucharist - in order to become fully initiated into the Catholic church. Also, if baptized in other Christian faiths, you can join into full communion with the Catholic church.

Adult Confirmation- if you received your Baptism and Communion and never completed your confirmation. **NOW IS THE TIME TO REGISTER. Call 718-769-6311 for more information.**


